BOARD SET GOALS FOR 2005

- Coordinate the purchase of parkland or open space with our land preservation funds.
- Hold 2 cultural events this summer at Leslie E. Tassell Park.
- Hold semi-annual meetings with all Township boards, commissions and committees to discuss goals and common issues.
- Work with "The Rapid" to create additional transportation opportunities for seniors and people with disabilities who work in Cascade Township.
- Support the efforts of the Cascade Community Foundation to create a separate Cascade telephone directory, as a means to create an identity for Cascade.
- Review various Township programs, including area recycling programs to determine their cost effectiveness and use by Township residents.
- Research the feasibility of making Cascade "wireless".
- Establish a consistent plan for the installation of sidewalks along 28th Street.
- Finish planning and start construction of the library addition, including a history room.
- Review and Implement the recommendations in the disability accessibility study (conducted by Disability Advocates) for all Township-owned facilities.

Election News

Precinct Location Change

Clerk Ron Goodyke announces a change in location for those voters in Precinct 3 who vote at the Forest Hills Presbyterian Church. This location is no longer available and those voters will now vote in the program room at the Cascade Library, located at 2870 Jacksmith S.E. You will enter the front door of the library and follow the signs to the Program Room. This is a permanent change for Precinct 3 voters.

Vote May 3

HAVA (Help America Vote Act) has specified that beginning in 2005, elections will be held only four times each year for any election issue. The next date for an election is May 3. HAVA also requires consolidation of elections, resulting in no separate school elections. Voters will consistently use the same polling place for all elections— where you voted in November in the Presidential election is where you vote for any issue including school issues. The only exception is the permanent change of location for precinct 3 from the Forest Hills Presbyterian Church to the Cascade Library.

In the May 3 election, both Forest Hills Public Schools and Grand Rapids Community College will have two candidates running unopposed for two open seats on their Boards of Education. In Forest Hills the candidates are Maureen Fischer and Doug VanderLaan, and for GRCC, the candidates are Janice L. Maggini and Michael A. Stearns.

In addition, in a move to minimize future election costs and provide sufficient budget planning option, the Forest Hills Board of Education voted to hold the required 18 mill non-homestead renewal election at the same time. This millage does not affect primary residences; it was last approved by 95% of the voters on June 10, 1996, for a ten-year period, and is scheduled to expire in the 2005-2006 school year. Voters will be asked to renew the 18 mills currently levied on business and commercial property for ten years, through 2015-16.

The April/May issue of the school district's newsletter, *Focus*, will have detailed information about Board candidates and the 18 mill non-homestead renewal ballot question. A fact sheet explaining the ballot question will be available in school offices. New Voting Machines

Yet another result of HAVA is that the State of Michigan requires all municipalities to change to new Optech voting equipment. This is a **funded** mandate. Cascade Township will have new voting tabulators to replace the well-used, older models that have been in service in Cascade Township for several years. The new, improved machines will **not** change the way you vote in the booth—you simply fill in the oval for the person or issue you are in favor. This machine will prevent errors you may make in marking the ballot. The machine will alert the voter that an error has been made and allows the voter to see what the error is and provide the opportunity to correct that error.

Voter Cards and Registration

The last day to register to vote is 30 days prior to the May 3 election. Since that falls on Sunday, the law requires that it must be moved to the next business day, which is Monday, April 4. The Cascade Township Office will be open from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. The National Voter Registration Act allows voter registration at any of the following locations:

- 1) Secretary of State Branch Office
- 2) Secretary of State "Renewal by Mail" when you renew your driver license
- 3) Cascade Township Clerk's Office or the Kent County Clerk's Office
- 4) State or federal mail-in registration form
- Michigan Department of Social Services, which administer benefits for ADFC, Medicaid, and Food Stamp programs. Also county health department offices which administer benefits for the Women. Infants and Children program (WIC)
- 6) Armed Forces Recruitment offices
- 7) Federal Post Card Application procedure. (FPCA)
- 8) Direct delivery of registration applications by persons associated with voter registration drives. Usually they use the state and federal registration forms developed to implement the Mail Registration Program

New voter registration cards will be sent to each registered voter in Cascade Township before the May election.

Please be sure you are a registered voter and can participate on May 3rd.

Passport Applications can now be obtained and accepted at the Cascade Township Office

Cascade Township is pleased to announce that it now accepts passport applications on behalf of the U.S. Department of State. U.S. citizens planning international travel may apply for their passports Monday through Thursday from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and Friday's from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. at the Cascade Township Office located at 2865 Thornhills S.E. Clerk Ron Goodyke reminds anyone interested in foreign travel that there are some important pieces of information needed to obtain a passport:

Proof of U.S. Citizenship
 Current Photo ID
 2 Passport Photographs
 Appropriate fees

There are several advantages to our citizens by having this service available at the Cascade Township Office. First and foremost is the convenience of being able to get the application process done right here in the neighborhood. Groups that plan trips abroad can contact the Township office to arrange for Township personnel to accommodate the process for an entire group at your site if that will be more convenient. The cost is the same no matter where the application is processed, but by coming to the Cascade Office your local municipality benefits from the processing fee which contributes to all of us who live, work, shop, or play here. It is not necessary to be a Cascade Township resident to apply for a passport at our office.

C.P.R. Classes Available to Township Residents

Life threatening emergencies can occur any time of the year, but with increased activity in the summer months, so is the risk of an emergency. The Cascade Township Fire Department is an American Heart Association Community Training Center (CTC) and is offering to citizens of the township a Family & Friends C.P.R. Class. The Family & Friends program is an awareness class dedicated to recognizing life threatening emergencies, instructions on effectively calling 911 and what to do in the first few minutes. The program lasts a little more than an hour, depending on the number of participants and costs just \$10.00 per person. This class is NOT intended for those seeking a C.P.R. certificate for their employment.

Pedestrian Pathway Etiquette

Cascade Township maintains approximately 17 miles of pedestrian pathways for Township residents to enjoy. However, for the comfort and safety of pathway users, please remember the following:

- Always clean up after your dog.
- Walk, run or cycle on the right side of the trail in the direction you are going. Pass on the left.
- If you are on a bicycle or rollerblades and are approaching a pedestrian from the rear, please use common courtesy by announcing your presence when passing.
- Remember that cyclers 14 years and under are required to wear a helmet.

EAST PRECINCT UPDATE

The Kent County Sheriff's Department's East Precinct will be hosting its first "Children's Identification Program" on April 5, 6, and 7, during the morning from 9:00 am-11:30am and the afternoon from 1:00pm-3:30pm.

Officers from the East Precinct, located at 877 Forest Hills Ave., will be available each day to photograph and fingerprint any area child accompanied by a parent or legal guardian. Upon completion of this process, the parent will be provided the finished document containing an official record of their child's identification information. Officers will also be available to answer any questions regarding the latest information on children's bicycle and helmet safety laws, Neighborhood and Child Watch Programs, and the newly implemented, Child Is Missing Program.

The Kent County Sheriff's Department's East Precinct will also be seeking volunteers interested in patrolling the East Trail Pathways running throughout Ada, Cascade, and Grand Rapids Townships. Any interested individuals, 18 years or older, willing to walk, run, bike, or rollerblade through the trails, can be of great support to this newly expanding program. A volunteer's responsibilities will include but are not limited to:

- Providing assistance to citizens in need of any police or medical help,
- · Reporting any crimes or unusual activities, and
- Notifying the Sheriff's Department of any damages or vandalism located along the trails.

Septic Systems in Cascade Township

Did you know that just over 75% of the homes in Cascade Township use on-site septic systems to dispose of their wastewater? One of the main differences between a house with an on-site disposal system and a house hooked up to a public sewer system is that the homeowner is responsible to maintain the on-site septic system. That's why homeowners need to know the proper ways to use and maintain their septic systems in order for them to last. Kent County Health Department officials have indicated that all septic systems will fail at some point in time. At the point of failure (sewage on the ground surface or backups in the house) it is often necessary to replace the absorption field. If you suspect a failure, the Kent County Health Department (336-3089) can offer assistance to determine needed repairs.

What should not go through your septic system?


The following substances should not be put in the septic system: Cooking grease, oils, or fats; pesticides; paints; solvents; disinfectants; septic tank additives, cleansers, or yeast. Cooking grease, oils or fats should be placed in a container and put in household garbage. Pesticides, paints, paint thinners, solvents, disinfectants and other household chemicals are toxic substances that threaten ground water quality. There is no such thing as a safe and effective septic system additive and most harm your system.

What else do I need to do to manage my septic system? Conserve water use to avoid overloading your septic system. Your septic system is not a trash can, so do not treat it the way. Using your garbage disposal or depositing napkins, tampons, plastics, cat litter, or other solids is detrimental to your systems operation. Have your septic system inspected every 1-2 years and pumped periodically (usually every 3-5 years) by a licensed inspector/contractor. Know where your septic system is and do not drive or park heavy vehicles or build over it. This can compact the soil and crush your system. Know how your septic system works and keep records of repairs, pumpings, inspections, and other maintenance activities.

Following these steps is important in keeping your septic system a safe and economical method for treating and disposing of your wastewater onsite.

2005 GYPSY NOTH SPRAYING PROGRAM

By the first week of June, the Gypsy Moth Spraying Program will be underway in targeted areas throughout the township (see accompanying map). The Township will have 468 acres of property sprayed this year. This is a decrease in the number of acres being sprayed when compared to previous years.

Our consultant has indicated that the gypsy moth population has "crashed" to a certain extent due to natural predators and a virus that occasionally affects larvae populations.

The program area will be sprayed with a non-toxic biological agent called Bacillus thuringiensis or "Bt".

Some of the most common questions about gypsy moths follow:

What does "Bt" do to gypsy moths?

Gypsy moth larvae pass through different life stages: egg, caterpillar, cocoon and adult. Trees are endangered by the gypsy moth at the caterpillar stage only. When the caterpillar eats leaves sprayed with "Bt", it releases a protein that damages their stomachs. The caterpillars become sick and stop eating. During the next two or three days, bacteria enters the caterpillar's blood, eventually killing them.

Is "Bt" dangerous to people, pets and livestock, or other beneficial insects?

One of the benefits of "Bt" is that only young caterpillars are affected. "Bt" is harmless to people, even at high dosages. "Bt" does not harm other mammals, birds or fish. Most beneficial insects, including honeybees and ladybugs, are not affected.


What does a gypsy moth caterpillar look like?


The mature caterpillar reaches a length of approximately two inches. The caterpillar can be identified by the distinctive color pattern on its back. It will have a series of blue colored spots that are grouped in pairs, followed by a series of red spots grouped end

to end. Visit the Cascade Township website and you will find more information on identifying the gypsy moth caterpillars. (www.cascadetwp.com)

Remember, the gypsy moth does its damage during the caterpillar stage, which is during mid-May to mid-June. The gypsy moth caterpillar head is beige with dark marks. It has no silk tents. They are usually attached to the bark of the tree trunk.

If your trees are being defoliated later in the summer, it's caused by something other than gypsy moths.

On January 13th and March 10th, Cascade Historical Society sponsored the Life Story Writing Workshops facilitated by Cascade resident, Pam Daugavietis. Currently, Pam is a free-lance writer for the Blodgett Butterworth Health Care Foundation and is a certified Turning Memories Into Memoirs® workshop leader, editor and coach.

Approximately 30 people attended these programs with free will offerings going to support the Cascade Library History room addition. Many shared their desire to preserve stories of their lives for their own enjoyment or for future generations. Whether it is to share your hopes and dreams of your life or to leave a personal legacy, no one else sees the world through your eyes and with your heart.

Cascade Connection Library Addition

Plans are proceeding for the new "Enrichment Center" addition to the Cascade Library. It will include a 3,000-square foot dividable multi-purpose room, study rooms, additional basement storage and space dedicated to the Cascade Township Historical Society. The current program room will be revamped into a teen center.

The library has experienced a dramatic 170% growth in circulation since its new building opened in November, 1996. The popularity of the children, teens, adult, and family programs has increased accordingly and they quickly outgrew the space available to hold them. Many of the scheduled events, such as the Iditarod Dogs, Spanish Storytime, the Mad Hatter Party, the summer reading club and adult book discussions have audiences that exceed the number that can be accommodated in the current program room.

The Enrichment Center would resolve a number of challenges. It would greatly improve the library's ability to host events as the multi-purpose room could be divided into a number of different sized sections. The Historical Society currently houses their collections in the Cascade Museum where they can only be accessed by appointment. Having space in the library would allow for displays and greater accessibility of historical documents. The teen room would offer a comfortable place for group or individual study for middle and high school students, with available computers, listening stations and the hottest new teen books and magazines.

Financing for this project will be completed with no additional taxes. Cascade Township has pledged \$2.4 million in library millage funds with the remaining \$700,000 to be collected from private donors and gifts. Later this spring there will be an opportunity for every citizen to become a part of this exciting new chapter as the Cascade Library challenges you to "Imagine the Possibilities!"

Purchase Yard Waste Tags at the reception desk of the Township Offices from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Tags are \$1.00 each Pick up will be every Monday From April 11 through May 9

- Please have your yard waste near the curb by 6:00 a.m. to assure pick up.
- Place a tag on each bag of leaves or bundle of branches. (No grass clippings, dirt, sod, cement, sand or rocks please).
- Please use 30 gal. plastic bags or paper yard waste bags.
- Sticks should be no longer than 4 feet

in length and branches, logs and stumps are not to exceed 1 inch in diameter.


- Residents 62 years of age and older and residents with disabilities will receive 20 tags FREE / per calendar year.
